## Course Aims

### Integrated Foundation Year:

This course introduces you to the fundamentals of filmmaking and screenwriting practice. It will help the development of your creative, critical and craft skills in preparation for progression to the accelerated BA (Hons) programme and integrates professional practice through collaboration on BA and MA graduation films.

### BA(Hons) Screenwriting:

The accelerated two-year BA (Hons) Screenwriting at Central Film School introduces students to the fundamentals of screenwriting practice across various media.

We aim to foster future screenwriters and develop your craft skills in a unique, inclusive and collaborative environment designed to nurture and inspire your creativity and ambition. The course will develop your contextual knowledge and analytical skills to prepare you to engage confidently with, and challenge, the fast changing media landscape. Technical and craft teaching mirrors real-world workflows, practices and technological innovations.

The course is structured with core practical craft and contextual modules that include visual storytelling, screen studies, genre analysis, writing coverage, episodic drama, adaptation, interactive storytelling and will culminate in a major feature film project.

Our projects mirror the film industry's workflow and creative environments. Collaborative projects and research will help you meet the film industry professional standards and understand the cultural and industrial needs of your chosen sector. You will be taught by industry professionals and learn through doing in order to build your skills and confidence to enter the contemporary media job market.

In small teams of diverse, dedicated and talented students, you will participate in the exchange of ideas, skills and experiences. You will have an opportunity to interact with high-profile film industry practitioners available via our Professional Perspective panels and visiting lecturer programmes.

### BA(Hons) Screenwriting:

As you progress through the BA (Hons) Screenwriting course at Central Film School you will develop an understanding of the art and craft of Screenwriting. Both transferable and employability skills will be embedded into your learning through both structured collaborative practice and reflective thinking, and the increasing execution of your writing craft..

The course will offer you an opportunity to practice the following skills that can be used in professional settings in film and creative industries, as well as in academia and beyond:

**Industry & Business Knowledge:** You will develop an ability to recognise and apply relevant terminologies, formats, technologies and processes to your creative practice or evaluation of others' work.

**Critical Thinking & Analysis:** You will develop an ability to look below the surface of film, make connections and reflect on different social and creative perspectives. Through this process, you will build a more profound understanding not only of film but also of values and attitudes in contemporary global societies that influence what you see on the screen.

**Expanded Worldview:** You will appreciate a range of diverse creative practices and modes of expression. You will also develop social and political sensitivity, especially regarding representation.

**Ethical and Legal Responsibilities:** You will progress your understanding of how to work professionally within industry-standard ethical and legal frameworks.

**Problem Solving and Innovation:** You will grow your capability to logically and critically evaluate current screenwriting practices and progress your creativity towards innovation by applying conceptual models to practical challenges.

**Imagination and Creativity:** You will gain confidence to determine your potential contribution to the creative industries, finding the courage to use creative solutions and produce unique and original work.

**Collaboration and Team Working:** You will develop a positive attitude when working with others in a respectful, organised and collaborative manner.

**Organisation:** You will advance your project and time management skills.

**Entrepreneurial skills:** You will learn to identify and take advantage of professional and personal opportunities. You will develop your business awareness and understand what effort is required should you choose to work as a freelancer.

**Communication skills:** You will practice an ability to articulate your ideas in writing and speech in a coherent and clear manner that can be understood by non-specialist audiences.

**Personal Development:** You will be advised on how to define your priorities, manage your time effectively, develop an understanding of personal strengths and weaknesses and find ways of responding to constructive criticism and feedback. Your ability to forge productive relationships with others and to understand the essential elements of how creativity is fostered in team environments will go on to support you and your ambitions in your academic career and beyond.

Despite its immediate subject focus on screenwriting, the course will also prepare you for other types of creative industry careers. All the above skills are transferable, which means that they can be adapted and deployed in a variety of fields and careers.

## **Structure of Course Delivery**

### **Integrated Foundation Year:**

#### **Course Design**

The foundations of a professional and collaborative sensibility will be laid in this foundation year of study that prepares you for the BA (Hons) two-year fast track degree. The focus of this foundation year is on laying the groundwork through collaborative project development to gain a deeper understanding of the filmmaking process and its wider contexts. Your ability to forge productive relationships with others and to understand the essential elements of how creativity is fostered in team environments will support you and your ambitions in the next stage of your academic career and beyond.

The foundation year is structured with five modules over a two-term academic year. The first term commences with the Foundation in Screen Practice module which will provide an introduction to filmmaking techniques and equipment through technical induction sessions, workshops and supervised studio practice. Your understanding of the equipment will be applied to the making of a short film where you will also learn about the basic production management paperwork required when producing a film project. The Screen Industries Research module will familiarise you with study skills and research methodologies that develop your ability to search for, locate, extract, organise, evaluate, use, present and retain relevant information appropriate to your study. Writing Short Scripts will introduce you to dramaturgy, narrative structure and character development through lectures, seminars and practical exercises. In term two, the Professional Practice module introduces you to the practical film production process, including the production stages, elements and organisational requirements. In Final Group Project module, the filmmakers will choose a screenwriting project and develop that into a short film on which all students will collaborate fulfilling the production roles

On the BA (Hons) two-year fast track degree you will begin to specialise in either Practical Filmmaking or Screenwriting and develop a deeper understanding of the importance and power of cinematic filmmaking and storytelling.

Module teaching, learning and assessment take a variety of forms, both to offer an inclusive, safe and supportive environment for you to learn in and to enable multiple possibilities for constructive feedback to allow you the opportunity to fulfil your potential. Module teaching is led by both experienced specialist academics and practicing filmmakers and is supported by a team of technicians who facilitate the development of your skills with our filmmaking equipment and share their real-world experiences. This teaching and learning is enriched by regular opportunities to listen and talk to guest lecturers who are all active and successful in their field. You will be taught by staff in a variety of ways:

**Lectures:** Traditional lectures are used for the conveying of complex ideas or for the clarifying of assessment and other course requirements.

**Seminars:** These are a chance for you to spend time with your tutor and peers investigating ideas and processes. It is also an opportunity to work on your assessments and receive support from the broader academic community where you can engage with ideas and develop your understanding in a safe and supportive environment.

**Individual Tutorials:** Tutorials with tutors and course leaders allow you to really get to grips with your understanding of a module and/or an assignment, as well as to discuss your progress and seek support in terms of time, project and personal management.

**Technical Inductions:** Our technicians will enhance your skills in handling our camera, sound and lighting equipment.

**Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) and Online Learning:** Modules may employ different forms of online learning to enhance your experience and add to the diverse ways of learning that you will experience on the course. Online spaces are used to provide a safe and supportive environment to help you stay engaged with work and peers across modules and between periods of teaching and assessment.

**Crits/Peer Learning:** We have a wide variety of approaches to peer learning, including pitching/feedback sessions and crits, where you share work-in-progress and support each other in honing work for assessment and beyond. This activity helps you learn how to critique constructively and how to improve your work from reading others' approaches and acting on their feedback..

**Professional Masterclasses:** Your core learning is supplemented by a programme of guest speakers who deliver talks and masterclasses across a range of specialisms and professions.

**Workshops:** Workshops involve you developing specific craft skills and applying your learning to productions and assessment. They also facilitate your own personal, creative and professional development.

**Learning Community:** You will work on productions for the BA (Hons) and short course students that will develop your professional practice and extend your network within the school community.

## **BA(Hons) Screenwriting:**

### **Pedagogy**

The BA programme develops our successful Integrated Foundation course that introduces you to the fundamentals of filmmaking and screenwriting practice.

The BA (Hons) Screenwriting course delivers the curriculum using strategies that encourage independence, self reliance and group co-operation. You are expected to take responsibility for your learning and encouraged to explore the uses of blended learning techniques when working with your peers.

The collaborative nature of filmmaking is emphasised on all courses at Central Film School. As such you will undertake group work on introductory joint modules. Creative practice teaching will outline the nature and interrelationship between core roles used in film production and how they might change in different situations. Screenwriting modules are structured to reflect both the individual writing process and the collaborative writer's room experience. This will allow you to encounter real world working practices during which you will share knowledge and develop understanding of cooperation, negotiation, compromise, leadership and management and team hierarchies in preparation for your entry into industry.

At Level 4 modules are designed to introduce you to the fundamental principles and practices of screenwriting. At Level 5 you will gain a deeper understanding of the writing process, its wider contexts and develop your understanding of formats, genre and craft skills. At Level 6 you will consolidate your creative practice with the development of a feature film and have the opportunity to pitch a short script for a graduation film production.

### **Teaching Sessions**

Module teaching, learning and assessment take a variety of forms to offer an inclusive, safe and supportive learning environment for all students and enable multiple possibilities for constructive feedback so that you can fulfil your potential. These modules are led by specialist academics and practicing screenwriters who share their real-world film experience and are supported by a team of experienced technicians. This is enhanced by regular opportunities to listen and talk to visiting speakers through our Professional Perspectives Programme.

You will be taught by staff in a variety of ways:

**Lectures:** You will be taught by staff in a variety of ways. Sometimes there will be traditional lectures, for the conveying of complex ideas or for the clarifying of assessment and other course requirements.

**Seminars:** These are a chance for you to spend time with your tutor and peers investigating ideas and processes. It is a chance to work on your assessments and receive support from a variety of people and a chance to engage with ideas and develop your understanding in a safe and supportive environment.

**Technical Inductions:** Our technicians will enhance your skills in handling our camera, sound and lighting equipment.

**Workshops:** Workshops are where you will develop specific craft skills and apply the content you are learning to your writing and for assessment as well as to further your own personal, creative and professional development.

**Professional Masterclasses:** Core learning is supplemented by a programme of guest speakers who deliver talks and masterclasses across a range of specialisms and career paths.

**Crits/Peer Learning:** We have a wide variety of approaches to peer learning including pitching/feedback sessions and crits, where you share work in progress and support each other in honing work for assessment and beyond.
